The Unstoppable Irish follows the changing

fortunes of New York's Irish Catholics, commencing with the evacuation of British military forces in late 1783 and concluding one hundred years later with the completion of the initial term of the city's first Catholic mayor. During that century, Hibernians first coalesced and then rose in uneven progression from being a variously dismissed, despised, and feared foreign group to ultimately receiving de facto acceptance as constituent members of the city's population. Dan Milner presents evidence that the Catholic Irish of New York gradually integrated (came into common and equal membership) into the city populace rather than assimilated (adopted the culture of a larger host group). Assimilation had always been an option for Catholics, even in Ireland. In order to fit in, they needed only to adopt mainstream Anglo-Protestant identity. But the same virile strain within the Hibernian psyche that had overwhelmingly rejected the abandonment of Gaelic Catholic being in Ireland continued to hold forth in Manhattan and the community remained largely intact. A novel aspect of Milner's treatment is his use of song texts in combination with period news reports and existing scholarship to develop a fuller picture of the Catholic Irish struggle. Products of a highly verbal and passionately musical people, Irish folk and popular songs provide special insight into the popularly held attitudes and beliefs of the integration epoch.

The Ancient Music of Ireland Arranged for Piano - Edward Bunting 2011-04-20

Edward Bunting (1773-1843), the first systematic collector of Irish folksongs, was educated as an organ and piano player in Belfast. His life's work fell upon him at nineteen years old, when he was commissioned as a scribe to notate performances at a gathering of traditional harp players in Belfast in July 1792. He was so inspired by the music that, aided by some of the harpers, he embarked immediately upon travels around northwest Ireland to collect some of the old songs already close to disappearing. He published his first collection of Irish music four years later. In that volume and two later ones, he published almost 300 airs—some of them, according to tradition, dating as far back as the tenth century—and practically single-handedly rescued his country's ancient music from oblivion. The present collection, the last of Bunting's three such gatherings, contains 151 Irish airs arranged for piano, with the Irish names of the airs, their authors, and (where known) their dates of composition. Hard to find elsewhere, this is an indispensable book not only for students or

Historical Perspectives** - Martin Dowling
2016-02-24

Written from the perspective of a scholar and
performer, Traditional Music and Irish Society
investigates the relation of traditional music to
Irish modernity. The opening chapter integrates
a thorough survey of the early sources of Irish
music with recent work on Irish social history in
the eighteenth century to explore the question of
the antiquity of the tradition and the class
locations of its origins. Dowling argues in the
second chapter that the formation of what is
today called Irish traditional music occurred
alongside the economic and political
modernization of European society in the late
eighteenth and early nineteenth centuries.

Dowling goes on to illustrate the public
discourse on music during the Irish revival in
newspapers and journals from the 1880s to the
First World War, also drawing on the works of
Pierre Bourdieu and Jacques Lacan to place the
field of music within the public sphere of
nationalist politics and cultural revival in these
decades. The situation of music and song in the
Irish literary revival is then reflected and
interpreted in the life and work of James Joyce,
and Dowling includes treatment of Joyce's short
stories A Mother and The Dead and the 'Sirens'
chapter of Ulysses. Dowling conducted field
work with Northern Irish musicians during 2004
and 2005, and also reflects directly on his own
experience performing and working with
musicians and arts organizations in order to
conclude with an assessment of the current state
of traditional music and cultural negotiation in
Northern Ireland in the second decade of the
twenty-first century.

Irish Session Tune Book - Cari Fuchs 1997

**The Musical Traditions of Northern Ireland
and its Diaspora** - David Cooper 2017-07-05

For at least two centuries, and arguably much
longer, Ireland has exerted an important
influence on the development of the traditional,
popular and art musics of other regions, and in
particular those of Britain and the United States.
During the past decade or so, the traditional
musics of the so-called Celtic regions have
become a focus of international interest. The
phenomenal success of shows such as
Riverdance (which appeared in 1995, spawned
from a 1994 Eurovision Song Contest interval
act) brought Irish music and dance to a global
audience and played a part in the further
commoditization of Irish culture, including
traditional music. However, there has been until
now, relatively little serious musicological study
of the traditional music of Northern Ireland.
Northern Ireland remains a divided community
in which traditional culture, in all its
manifestations, is widely understood as a marker
of religious affiliation and ethnic identity. Since
the outbreak of the most recent 'troubles'
around 1968, the borders between the
communities have often been marked by music.
For example, many in the Catholic, nationalist
community, regard the music of Orange flute
bands and Lambeg drums as a source of
intimidation. Equally, many in the Protestant
community have distanced themselves from Irish
music as coming from a different ethnic
tradition, and some have rejected tunes, styles

and even instruments because of their association with the Catholic community and the Irish Republic. Of course, during the same period many other Protestants and Catholics have continued to perform in an apolitical context and often together, what in earlier times would simply have been regarded as folk or country music. With the increasing espousal of a discrete Ulster Scots tradition since the signing of the Belfast (or 'Good Friday') Agreement in 1998, the characteristics of the traditional music performed in Northern Ireland, and the place of Protestant musicians within popular Irish culture

The Globalization of Irish Traditional Song Performance - Susan H. Motherway 2016-10-31
In *The Globalization of Irish Traditional Song Performance* Susan Motherway examines the ways in which performers mediate the divide between local and global markets by negotiating this dichotomy in performance practice. In so doing, she discusses the globalizing processes that exert transformative influences upon traditional musics and examines the response to these influences by Irish traditional song performers. In developing this thesis the book provides an overview of the genre and its subgenres, illustrates patterns of musical change extant within the tradition as a result of globalization, and acknowledges music as a medium for re-negotiating an Irish cultural identity within the global. Given Ireland's long history of emigration and colonisation, globalization is recognised as both a synchronic and a diachronic phenomenon. Motherway thus examines Anglo-Irish song and songs of the Irish Diaspora. Her analysis reaches beyond essentialist definitions of the tradition to examine evolving sub-genres such as Country & Irish, Celtic and World Music. She also recognizes the singing traditions of other ethnic groups on the island of Ireland including Orange-Order, Ulster-Scots and Traveller song. In so doing, she shows the disparity between native conceptions and native realities in respect to Irish cultural Identity."

The Irishness of Irish Music - John O'Flynn 2017-07-05

This book brings together important material from a range of sources and highlights how government organizations, musicians, academics and commercial companies are concerned with, and seek to use, a particular notion of Irish musical identity. Rooting the study in the context of the recent history of popular, traditional and classical music in Ireland, as well as providing an overview of aspects of the national field of music production and consumption, O'Flynn goes on to argue that the relationship between Irish identity and Irish music emerges as a

contested site of meaning. His analysis exposes the negotiation and articulation of civic, ethnic and economic ideas within a shifting hegemony of national musical culture, and finds inconsistencies between and among symbolic constructions of Irish music and observed patterns in the domestic field. More specifically, O'Flynn illustrates how settings, genres, social groups and values can influence individual identifications or negations of Irishness in music. While the apprehension of intra-musical elements leads to perceptions of music that sounds Irish, style and authenticity emerge as critical articulatory principles in the identification of music that feels Irish. The celebratory and homogenizing discourse associated with the international success of some Irish musical forms is not reflected in the opinions of the people interviewed by O'Flynn; at the same time, an insider/outsider dialectic of national identity is found in various forms of discourse about Irish music. Performers and composers discussed include Bill Whelan (Riverdance), Sinéad O'Connor, The Corrs, Altan, U2, Martin Hayes, Dolores Keane and Gerald Barry.
