public outrage ensued, as schizophrenia, "the sacred symbol of psychiatry," in the words of Thomas Szasz (1976), emerged as a king of Alice in Wonderland travesty. Schizophrenia seemed not to be a legitimate diagnostic entity but some sort of facade erected to protect the guilty. In 1973, David Rosenhan had already shown the readers of *Science* that schizophrenia was a label that could be given to normal people presenting with a supposed auditory hallucination on even one occasion. In Rosenhan's studies, mental health professionals were outclassed by the regular psychiatric hospital patients, who correctly saw the false schizophrenics as imposters while the professional diagnosticians continued to fool themselves.

The new practice guideline format is also designed to be more user friendly by dividing information into modules on specific clinical questions. Each module has a consistent organization, which will assist users in finding clinically useful and relevant information quickly and easily. This new edition of the practice guidelines on psychiatric evaluation for adults is the first set of the APA's guidelines developed under the new guideline development process. These guidelines address the following nine

Results: Low illness insight correlated with low levels of social adaptation. Low social adaptation correlated inversely with the case managers' assessment of more social support needs for their client. The clients' low subjective life satisfaction correlated with higher client rated social support needs.

The client and case manager rated social support needs correlated strongly. Conclusions: Low illness insight may be an indicator of low social adaptation that might require increased case manager engagement to meet more client social support needs. Schizophrenia has significant impact on patient's lifestyle due to its effect on patients' cognition, perception, attention, physical function and their psychosocial skills. Cognitive behavioral therapy is a part of treatment modalities developed recently for treating schizophrenic patients. The cognitive behavioral therapy and psychosocial intervention in many studies proved its effectiveness in preventing relapse, improving coping skills, developing better social & vocational functioning

and abilities to function more independently. The sample consisted of 40 schizophrenic patients from inpatient department of Tanta Mental Health Hospital, Ministry of Health. Five instruments were used to collect the data for the current study. Sociodemographic & personal characteristics sheet, Brief Psychiatry Rating Scale, Taylor Anxiety Manifest Scale, the arabic version of Wechsler Adult Intelligence Scale (WAIS) developed by Mellika, and Observational Behavioral Assessment Sheet developed by Omar, 1993. After assessment the sample was classified into two group (experimental group) & (control group). A constructed cognitive behavioral intervention was developed by the researcher & implemented with experimental group on 24 sessions, twice weekly, 45-60 minutes for each. Data were statistically analyzed & results revealed that there was a significant difference between experimental & control group regarding their reduction of psychotic symptoms, Anxiety level & information

*Plum and Posner's Diagnosis and Treatment of Stupor and Coma* - Jerome B. Posner 2019

Plum and Posner's *Diagnosis and Treatment of Stupor and Coma*, 5th edition, is a major update of the classic work on diagnosing the cause of coma, with the addition of completely new sections on treatment of comatose patients, by Dr. Jan Claassen, the Director of the Neuro-ICU at Columbia New York Presbyterian Hospital. The first chapter of the book provides an up-to-

date review on the brain mechanisms that maintain a conscious state in humans, and how lesions that damage these mechanisms cause loss of consciousness or coma. The second chapter reviews the neurological examination of the comatose patient, which provides the basis for determining whether the patient is suffering from a structural brain injury causing the coma, or from a metabolic disorder of consciousness. The third and fourth chapters review the pathophysiology of structural lesions causing coma, and the specific disease states that result in coma. Chapter five is a comprehensive treatment of the many causes of metabolic coma. Chapter 6 review psychiatric causes of unresponsiveness and how to identify and treat them. Chapters 7 and 8 review the overall emergency treatment of comatose patients, followed by the treatment of specific causes of coma. Chapter 9 examines the long term outcomes of coma, including the minimally conscious state and the persistent vegetative

state, and how they can be distinguished, and their implications for eventual useful recovery. Chapter 10 reviews the topic of brain death and the standards for examination of a patient that are required to make the determination of brain death. The final chapter 11 is by J.J. Fins, a medical ethicist who was invited by the other authors to write an essay on the ethics of diagnosis and treatment of patients who, by definition, have no way to approve of or communicate about their wishes. While providing detailed background for neurological and neurosurgical specialists, the practical nature of the material in this book has found its greatest use among Internists, Emergency Medicine, and Intensive Care specialists, who deal with comatose patients frequently, but who may not have had extensive neurological training.
