The fifty honors colleges and programs are (1) within state universities that rank in the top 75 in the 2012 U.S. News rankings; (2) or within state universities that are members of the prestigious Association of American Universities; or (3) have already gained significant recognition as leaders in honors education. The book has 58 charts, including one that summarizes all the data for each program. The individual

charts follow a narrative (900-1400 words) about each program. Other charts show comparisons of all 50 programs.
