The two principal axes of inquiry are Malraux's ongoing quest for a dimension of transcendence within human life and, at least as compelling, his search for the most appropriate and effective means by which to express a changing awareness of just what that dimension might be. Not surprisingly, in a world apparently doomed to languish in the spectral shadow of Death, there are certain constants: a yearning for some fraternity to combat man's essential solitude, a refusal to sink without effort into the vortex of the Absurd, a conviction that life is to be lived fully and intensely. The human condition is what it is. The ways in which

Malraux's characters, and of course Malraux himself, cope with this condition reveal a clear evolution, especially from the 1933 novel *La condition humaine* onwards. The reader follows Malraux from playful adolescence through the dichotomy of anguish and glorification in his middle years, towards the primarily interrogative utterances of the mature man. The often frivolous, sometimes sardonic, humour of youth gives way first to a painful recognition of the abyss, then to the discovery of a very tentative equilibrium in the philosophy of metamorphosis espoused by an older Malraux. *André Malraux: Towards the Expression of Transcendence* reveals the principal steps by which Malraux achieved that equilibrium.

*Picasso's Mask* - André Malraux 1995-03-22

Following Pablo Picasso's death in 1973, André Malraux was summoned by Jacqueline Picasso, the artist's widow, to her home at Mougins in the South of France. There, surrounded by Picasso's powerful last paintings "painted face to face with death," and his art collection destined for the Louvre, Malraux recollected Picasso's rebellious life and the metamorphosis of his art. In *Picasso's Mask*, Malraux's memories, at once personal and historical, evoke Picasso as a private man and as a legendary artistic genius. For over half a century, André Malraux (1901-1976) was intimately involved in French intellectual life, as philosopher, novelist, soldier, statesman, and secretary for cultural affairs. Malraux knew Picasso well, and here recollects a number of his conversations with the painter. In rich, evocative, and memory-filled prose, he has written an inspiring and moving reminiscence. *Picasso's Mask* is one of the most profound works in Malraux's remarkable oeuvre.

What does human life look like without the imposing presence of the state? asks Manent. In raising this question about Montaigne's *Essays*, Manent poses a question of great relevance to our contemporary situation. He argues that Montaigne's philosophical reflections focused on what he famously called *la condition humaine*, the human condition. Manent tracks Montaigne's development of this fundamental concept, focusing especially on his reworking of pagan and Christian understandings of virtue and pleasure, disputation and death. Bringing new form and content together, a new form of thinking and living is presented by Montaigne's *Essays*, a new model of a thoughtful life from one of the unsung founders of modernity. Throughout, Manent suggests alternatives and criticisms, some by way of contrasts with other thinkers, some in his own name. This is philosophical engagement at a very high level. In showing the unity of Montaigne's work, Manent's study will appeal especially to students and scholars of political theory, the history of modern philosophy, modern literature, and the origins of modernity.

Seeking inspiration for a new font design in an antique store in small-town Stillwater, Minnesota, graphic designer Carolyn Porter stumbled across a bundle of letters and was immediately drawn to their beautifully expressive pen-and-ink handwriting. She could not read the letters—they were in French—but she noticed all of them had been signed by a man named Marcel and mailed from Berlin to his family in France during the middle of World War II. Published serially between 1928 and 1931, *Shanghai* tells the story of a group of Japanese expatriates living in the International Settlement at the time of the May 30th Incident of 1925. The personal lives and desires of the main characters play out against a historical backdrop of labor unrest, factional intrigue, colonialist ambitions, and racial politics. The author, Yokomitsu Riichi (1898-1947), was an essayist, writer, and critical theorist who became one of the most powerful and influential literary figures in Japan during the 1920s and 1930s. He looked to contemporary avant-garde movements in Europe -- Dadaism, futurism, surrealism, expressionism -- for inspiration in his effort to explode the conventions of literary language and to break free of what he saw as the prisonhouse of modern culture. Yokomitsu incorporated striking visuality into a realistic mode that presents a disturbing picture of a city in turmoil. The result is a brilliant evocation of Shanghai as a gritty ideological battleground and as an exotic landscape where dreams of sexual and economic domination are nurtured.

Ce volume donne à voir toutes les facettes de l'oeuvre de Malraux. Le romancier y côtoie l'essayiste, le penseur de tous les arts - cinéma, peinture, sculpture, littérature - et du Musée imaginaire, l'(anti-)mémorialiste, et l'orateur dont la voix retentit dans "la nuit de décembre à Paris, avec des étoiles glacées au-dessus de la découpe des cheminées de Daumier", pour accompagner Jean Moulin au Panthéon. "Me croyez-vous mort ?" lui écrivait Picasso, que l'on avait oublié d'inviter à

une exposition de ses propres oeuvres. "Me croyez-vous ministre ?" lui répondit Malraux. Malraux, le croyez-vous ministre ? Il l'a été, et non des moindres, dans une fidélité souvent mal comprise à ses engagements de toujours. Mais il fut avant tout un écrivain. Quarante ans après sa mort, où en sommes-nous avec Malraux écrivain ? Ce volume est l'une des réponses possibles à cette question.
