Often dismissed as too pretty and superficial by critics, these later works reflect Manet's elegant social world, propose a radical new alignment of modern art with fashionable femininity, and record the artist's unapologetic embrace of beauty and visual pleasure in the face of death. Featuring nearly three hundred illustrations and nine fascinating essays by established and emerging Manet specialists, a technical analysis of the late Salon painting *Jeanne (Spring)*, a selection of the artist's correspondence, a chronology, and more, *Manet and Modern Beauty* brings a diverse range of approaches to bear on a little-studied area of this major artist's oeuvre.
